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Course description

The goal of this course is to introduce students to some of the most significant historical, political, social and cultural aspects of French society. Although we will start the class with an overview of some of the founding events in French history, our focus will mostly on modern France, from WWII to the present time. Throughout the course of this semester, we will discuss topics such as (but not limited to): politics, immigration, religion, the arts, food or the welfare system.

Through selected readings, videos and presentations, students will gain knowledge of the specificities of French society, its assets as well as its drawbacks. We will also welcome guest speakers who will provide us with new insights on specific issues.

ATTENDANCE: Attendance is <u>mandatory</u>. No credit will be given for a missed test, or quiz due to an unexcused absence; **late homework assignments won't be accepted.**

PARTICIPATION/PREPARATION: Although I will sometimes offer you lectures on specific aspects of French culture, most of our sessions are designed as discussions, either in small groups or the entire class. In order for you to be prepared, you will have some assigned readings to do and, for each topic, a worksheet to complete that will help structure our discussions. It is essential that you do this work before coming to class. The quality of our discussions and the overall benefits you will get from this class greatly depend on your willingness to come prepared and ready to discuss and ask questions.

Keep in mind that I will randomly ask students to discuss the film and/or the article at the beginning of the class to start our discussion.

You will also have to post comments and/or questions on the forum on *Moodle*. These comments/questions will be connected to the assigned chapter(s) you had to read for the class. They will allow me to see that the readings have been done as well as help me figure out what might be the issues regarding specific topics. (see calendar for the dates when the comments/questions should be posted)

QUIZZES: You will have 4 quizzes, each one of them focused on one or more of the topics discussed in class. (see calendar for more information)

PRESENTATION: In groups of 2, you will give a 15-minute presentation on one of the topics discussed in class. Your presentation should discuss a specific aspect of a question/topic that we might have mentioned but didn't develop during class or bring out new information on a topic. Since the textbook offers many comparisons between the French and the US systems, this is also a method you can choose when researching for your subject. You will be graded according to the originality and quality of your research and the precision of the information you will provide us with. You should document your presentation by including critical sources and a bibliography.

FINAL PAPER: For this class, you will have to write a final research paper (7-8 pages) on a topic related to those discussed during the semester. The final paper is due Monday, Dec.7th

Friday, Sept. 18 th	 2 presentations: Presentation #1 will focus on specific aspects of the departments and regions of France (specific depts./regions; their economy; etc.) Presentation #2 will focus on specific aspects of France and/in Europe.
Friday, Sept. 25 th	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of French politics. One presentation can focus on specific aspects of the 5th Republic. One presentation can focus on the political state of France today.
Friday, Oct. 2 nd	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of the education system. One presentation can focus on the current issues/debates surrounding education. One presentation can focus on the current issues regarding higher education. One presentation could focus on how the system favors inequalities within French society (regular education vs. "Z.E.P", etc.)
Monday, Oct. 12 th	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of WWII. One presentation could focus more particularly on "Vichy France" (what it meant; how was political and social life organized, etc.) One presentation could focus on one or more specific aspects of WWII.
Monday, Oct. 19 th	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of the Algerian war or the French colonies. One presentation could focus on the history of Algeria in relation to France and how the war had a lasting impact on the relationship between France and Algeria. One presentation could focus on the history of the French colonies.

Monday, Nov. 2 nd	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of immigration. One presentation could specifically focus on the history of immigration from North Africa. One presentation could focus on the political, social and economic issues regarding immigration in today's France (focus on the <i>banlieues</i>).
Monday, Nov. 9 th	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a different aspect of religion. One presentation could focus more specifically on the religion of Islam and the issues in French society. One presentation could focus on the significance/relevance of Catholicism in today's society (focus on <i>laïcitê</i>).
Monday, Nov. 30 th	 2 presentations: Each presentation must focus on a specific aspect of the welfare system. One presentation could focus more specifically on the evolution of the position of women in French society. One presentation could focus on the economic issues regarding the French welfare system. One presentation could offer a comparison of the French and the US system, highlighting their assets and drawbacks.
Monday, Dec. 7 th	 2 presentations: One presentation must focus on one aspect of French food (the significance of food in French society; the economy of food/French gastronomy; etc.) One presentation must focus on one aspect of French arts (a specific type of art – cinema; literature; painting; etc – a specific movement in art history and its impact on society; etc.)
