**CLASSROOM ETIQUETTE**: Learning a foreign language can be very intimidating; students are therefore strongly reminded to be kind towards classmates and supportive of each other's efforts.

**ATTENDANCE**: Attendance is <u>mandatory</u>. Students must contact the instructor by email or phone when sick or unable to attend class due to an emergency situation (sickness, accident, family emergency). Absences for ANY other reasons will not be excused; you must schedule your medical appointments, advising sessions and job interviews outside of class time. No credit will be given for a missed test, or quiz due to an unexcused absence; **late homework assignments won't be accepted.** 

**DAILY PARTICIPATION**: It will be evaluated daily on a 5-point scale according to the students' involvement, accuracy and effort to use French in the activities assigned.

5 points ..... Great accuracy in vocabulary, grammar and pronunciation & showed application

4 points ..... Occasional mistakes in vocabulary, grammar and/or pronunciation 3 points ..... Several mistakes in vocabulary, grammar and/or pronunciation

2 points .... Mistakes hinders communication

0 points .... Not present in class or did not participate

Strong emphasis will be placed on using exclusively French in the classroom. Anytime a language other than French will be used during activity time, a point will be deducted for that day, unless I have indicated otherwise. Tardiness will also result in the loss of points.

**HOMEWORK**: They will be in the form of online and written exercises; they will be regularly assigned, collected and graded.

Online exercises: They are available online through *Cengage Learning*; you must purchase an access key in order to have access to them. You may access them from your own computer or from a computer in the Language Learning Resource Center (LLRC), located in Thompson 210. Online assignments are due at the beginning of class on the due date, so be sure to complete them on time! Late assignments won't be accepted!

In-class exercises: In order to contextualize the grammar we will be learning this semester, I will provide you with handouts and activities that ask you to use the grammar/vocabulary in a more personal and productive way. A certain amount of preparation is needed prior to these activities in order for you to spend the class time working usefully and purposefully on the grammar/vocabulary. It is thus essential that you plan in advance and take the necessary time to prepare accordingly. The homework for the entire semester can be found on the

calendar after the syllabus, and the handouts will be available on *Moodle* to help you plan ahead.

**STUDIO HOURS:** FRENCH 204 is a four-credit course organized weekly around three lecture hours and two studio hours. Every week, to fulfill this studio requirement, students will work online individually on culture activities ('Studio Culture').

• 'Studio Culture': You will work on 9 'Studio Culture' during the semester. These are meant to expand your command of the French language beyond the material of the textbook, but with a connection in content and language to the chapter being studied at the time. These may involve listening to a song, watching a short video, or reading a "real" French text and will include a writing portion with a focus on applying the newly learned grammar and extending vocabulary on the topic.

**ORAL EXAMS:** There will be 2 oral tests during the semester. They will be taken during class time in my office. They will be in the form of a role play with a partner, asking and answering questions in French. They will be graded based on your ability to ask questions and answer them at length with detail and accuracy as far as grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation.

**MID-TERM GRAMMAR EXAM:** The mid-term grammar exam will cover the main grammar aspects covered in class up to that point (see calendar for what to study).

**FINAL GRAMMAR EXAM**: The final grammar exam will be cumulative and will cover the main grammar aspects discussed during the semester. More information will be provided in class.
